
Message from the Snoezelen Room Coordinator, Jody Brewer



Recipe corner

Pumpkin Snickerdoodles

Prep Time: 25 minutes

Cook Time: 13 minutes Yield: 3 dozen

Ingredients

· 3 1/4 cups all-purpose flour

· 3 1/2 tsp cornstarch

· 1 tsp cream of tartar

· 1 tsp baking soda

· 1/2 tsp baking powder

1/2 + 1/8 tsp salt

· 3/4 tsp ground cinnamon

· 1/2 tsp ground ginger

· 1/4 tsp ground nutmeg

· 1/4 tsp ground allspice

· 1 cup granulated sugar

· 3/4 cup packed light brown sugar

· 1 cup unsalted butter, softened

· 1 large egg yolk

· 3/4 cup canned pumpkin puree

1 1/2 tsp vanilla extract

For rolling

· 1/4 cup granulated sugar

· 1 1/2 tsp ground cinnamon

Directions

- In a mixing bowl whisk together flour, cornstarch, cream of tartar, baking soda, baking powder, salt, cinnamon, ginger, nutmeg and allspice for 20 seconds, set aside.
- In the bowl of an electric stand mixer fitted with the paddle attachment, cream together butter, granulated sugar and brown sugar (not until pale and fluffy, just to combined. Occasionally scrape down sides and bottom of bowl throughout entire mixing process if not using a paddle attachment that constantly scrapes bowl while mixing). Mix in egg yolk, then mix in pumpkin and vanilla extract. With mixer set on low speed, slowly add in dry ingredients then mix until combined. Divide dough in half and place each half in a bowl, cover with plastic wrap and chill 45 minutes to 1 hour (dough should be slightly sticky so the cinnamon sugar will stick when rolling but they should be manageable to roll in the palms of your hands). Preheat oven to 350 degrees during last 10 minutes of refrigeration.
- In a small bowl, whisk together 1/4 cup granulated sugar with 1 1/2 tsp cinnamon. Scoop dough out 2 even tablespoons at a time (run the measuring spoon against side and edge of bowl so it will slightly deflate the dough while also giving an equal tbsp, twice per ball) and shape into a ball, roll dough ball in cinnamon sugar mixture to evenly coat then transfer to Silpat or parchment paper lined baking sheets spacing cookies 2-inches apart. Bake in preheated oven 12 14 minutes (they should look just slightly under-baked as they'll cook slightly once removed from oven). Cool on baking sheet about 5 minutes then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely.




Day trip Ganong and Whale Watching!







"Matthew participated in all activities. Loved his award. Thank you!!" Audrey, Intervenor







Needed Supplies:

Bottle caps, washed and dried
White acrylic paint
Orange acrylic paint
Fine point black Sharpie marker
Small paintbrushes
Narrow ribbon
Hot glue gun & glue sticks
Small piece of yarn or ribbon (optional)



Tutorial:

Start by painting your bottle caps white. It's going to take probably three or four coats to both entirely cover the surface and also to get it look nice and smooth. Don't worry too much about the back as it will be pointing away from you on a tree or if hanging in a grouping on the wall, etc.

Once the caps are dry, cut a piece of narrow ribbon about two inches longer than the length of three stacked caps. Dab the back of each cap with hot glue and attach the ribbon, leaving the excess ribbon hanging from the top. Once dry, flip over and put a small dab of glue between each bottle cap to secure. At the top of the snowman fold the excess ribbon over to the back, creating a loop, and adhere with a dab of hot glue.

Once all glue is completely dry, use a fine paint brush and the orange paint to add a carrot-shaped nose to the first cap. Then use the Sharpie marker to dot on eyes and a mouth on the top cap, and three buttons on the middle cap.

At this point you can certainly leave your snowman as-is – they're already really cute! But you can dress them up even further by adding a bit of string, yarn, or ribbon around his neck and make a little scarf.
